PROGRAMME NOTES

FIELD BEHIND THE PLOW

Very early one morning, driving across the Prairies, Stan Rogers saw a farmer working in his field.That moment inspired this song, which many believe is the finest statement about the Canadian Wheat Farmer ever recorded.

FOUR STRONG WINDS

This is Ian Tyson's beloved Canadian folksong, about life in southern Alberta – love and loss. Men and women take turns carrying the melody while the piano emulates the guitar. Nickle's arrangement as been presented by honour choirs at PODIUM and ACDA conventions.

WOODSMOKE AND ORANGES

Waves roll across immense Lake Superior and crash against a remote granite shore. Tracts of windswept spruce and pine reach beyond the horizon from towering cliffs and along secluded sandy beaches. Black bears feast on blueberry bushes; haunting loon song scores sunsets; moose stilt-walk across wetlands. And the culture of the Anishinaabe First Nations connects Pukaskwa National Park's wilderness to the powerful richness of an ancient human story.

INDIAN PRAYER

With its memorable lyrics, beautiful melody, and haunting flute, the teachings of this piece link us with our ancestors. The Northern Spirit Flute was co-developed by Rich Dube of Saskatoon [Treaty 6 Territory], and the late Kevin Locke, SongKeeper of the Lakota People [of the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe and Anishnaabe of White Earth]. The tuning of the Northern Spirit Flute is designed to replicate the tuning of the 120 year old flute given to Kevin Locke by his grandfather Powesheik.

WATCHING THE APPLES GROW

Another of our favorite combinations a popular tune by Stan Rogers with a very upbeat choral arrangement by Ron Smail. This rollicking hoedown-type tune compares the joy and freedom of growing apples in the Annapolis Valley of Nova Scotia with life in the big city. Guess who wins?

SONG FOR THE MIRA

Song for the Mira was composed by Canadian singer/songwriter Allister MacGillivray and used in the film Marion Bridge. It has been recorded numerous times and in different languages. In 2018, it was inducted into The Canadian Songwriters Hall of Fame. Stuart Calvart's choral setting has become a modern concert classic. Marion Bridge is a Canadian rural community in Nova Scotia's Cape Breton Regional Municipality. The community is named for the eponymous bridge that crosses the Mira River. The song sings of the river and its people.

THE GRAND HOTEL

The Grand Hotel is a folksong about the comings and goings of guests at a hotel in a small town of Vancouver, along the old, now obsolete Cassiar Railway. The simple melody is full of amusing vocal techniques, making for a spirited, playful, and entertaining piece for performers and audiences alike.

KICKING-HORSE RIVER

A toe-tapper from the beginning, Kicking-Horse River brings to life the energy and spirit of one of Canada's great rivers. Written in a style reminiscent of Great Big Sea, this piece builds to a rousing finish, combining melodies as it goes. The flute and drum accompaniment are particularly effective and rousing. The Kicking Horse River is in the Canadian Rockies of southeastern British Columbia, Canada.

WE RISE AGAIN

Leon Dubinsky's well known coal miner's song was made popular by the Rankins, and this arrangement by Stephen Smith has been sung throughout Canada and the US by the men's choir, Chor Leoni. A great crowd pleaser, this version tugs at the heart-strings of all who see children as our hope for the future.

HYMN TO FREEDOM

Hymn to Freedom was arranged for choirs around the world to share their love of music, their hope for peace, and their friendship through song. This beautiful ballad combines a heartfelt text about liberty with a lyrical melody. The accompaniment by the jazz rhythm section [piano, bass, and drums] is a treat for both singers and audience members alike. Oscar Peterson's Hymn to Freedom carries deep musical meaning and cultural importance and is forever a gem in our Canadian cultural heritage. The Prince Albert Concert Choir was established in the autumn of 2012 by Robert and Lorna Gibson. They created a mixed-voice community choir to give singers an opportunity to sing the finest choral music from all genres, cultures, and languages, and to share joy with all.
